

ABOUT?

During the project we talked about issues which are important to us, young Europeans: cultural diversity in Europe and how to respect it.

We talked about it using non-formal education methods. We advertised the topic and propagated the outcome of our discussions. We think of it as our input into decreasing tensions in Europe which can be felt all around us. Our main methods were workshops and exercises in intercultural communication.

Our experience with those workshops show that thanks to them we are capable of developing knowledge in this field, develop the ability to work in a group, strengthen our confidence in public appearances, expand our language skills and learn critical thinking in discussions. Our meeting has confirmed that we chose the right methods.

All our methods: Integration games, team building, intercultural communication workshops, outdoor games, reflection groups, theatre play, brainstorm, intercultural simulation, world cafe, press conference, city games, presentations, discussions, trips, happening, exhibition.







ARRIVAL

We have finally met in Motycz! The Polish group has arrived earlier in order to prepare housing and the conference room. We needed to put up info cards, decide who's going to sleep where, set the chairs, logos of the organizations and our grantgiver – Polish-Ukrainian Council of Youth Exchanges. Each one of us gave all they had!

When the Ukrainan group arrived, we ate a meal together, got to know the building, ran an organizational meeting and some exercises in order to get to know each other. We were tired, but extremely excited when we went to beds.



We were very happy that all those young people took maters into their own hands since the very beginning. The amount of work they put into preparing the exchange assured me that this is going to be a great adventure for all of us.










THEATRE **PLAY**
